High density housing in Hood River (city and county) is irresponsible planning! Lets take a look at where we live. We're set in a beautiful valley full of visual appeal, community and recreational opportunities. Those who call the Hood River Valley home enjoy a wonderful quality of life. However, we live in a valley and a valley is similar to an island in that there is limited space. So, what happens when we use up this space for high density housing? We all lose.
